#### Council Corner

Shire President Broad & Deputy Shire President Halleen are Council's delegates for the Cue Parliament to be held on Friday 6 May 2011. Councillor Seaman and CEO Mike Sully will also attend as observers.

Councillor McTaggart is attending a Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency Forum in Melbourne on 18 and 19 May with costs being covered by the Dept. There will be representation from 90 Councils across Australia. The Forum is titled 'Local Adaptation Pathways Program Forum: from risk to action.'



Two new generators have been ordered for the Settlement which will bring welcome relief to residents after the myriad problems experienced with generator issues since the recent floods. The new system should be appropriate for the current and projected needs of the Settlement for some time.

Dan and Vicky Hewton, together with their daughter Casey have left the Settlement and the Shire of Murchison's employ. They have returned to Geraldton where Dan has obtained a truck driving position. The Shire is looking to replace Dan on the Works Crew and Vicky as cleaner of Settlement facilities.

Sharon Wundenberg will commence duties at the Settlement on Monday 9 May. Sharon will assist Works Supervisor Brian with the massive documentation requirements related to the flood damage. This has previously been undertaken by Brenda Hipper who will now take over management of 'The Big House' from Vicky Hewton.

#### Murchison's Roads

Most roads within the Shire are now open and Northcoast Contractors will be working to repair the flood damage for some time yet. By-passes have been constructed north of the Settlement to allow that section of road to be opened. There is a 50kph speed limit on these by-passes.

The opening of roads has resulted in a steady flow of visitors to the Settlement a number of whom have stayed for varying periods of time in the caravan park.

All Settlement accommodation is overflowing at the moment with the large number of Contractors and Tani is run off her feet catering for them at the roadhouse.

Ten kilometres of Carnarvon Mullewa Road are undergoing final preparation for sealing which should be completed by the end of the month. This will take the sealed section to the Twin Peaks turn-off.

The Shire maintenance crew is undertaking constant maintenance grading of roads.

Brian has been a polocrosse player, but has retired from the game while maintaining his interest. He also enjoys a game of tennis.



# sweet corn and cheese muffins

In a small bowl, whisk together egg, milk and butter. Pour milk mixture into the well in the flour mixture. Use a fork to mix ingredients until just combined.



Spoon mixture into 10 greased 1 cup (250 ml, 8 fl oz) capacity muffin tins. Bake for 20–30 minutes or until muffins are cooked when tested with a skewer. Turn onto wire racks to cool.






#### ingredients

250 g (8 oz) self-raising flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 315 g (10 oz) can corn kernels, drained 60 g (2 oz) cheddar, grated 2 tablespoons grated parmesan 1 egg, lightly beaten 3/4 cup (185 ml, 6 fl oz) milk 3 tablespoons butter, melted extra butter for greasing makes 10

1 (350°F, gas mark 4). Into a large bowl, sift flour and salt. Add corn, cheddar and parmesan, and mix to combine. Make a well in the centre of flour mixture.
