From The Works Supervisor



With the end of the year only 3 months away the shire's outside works crew are in full swing getting roads graded and construction works completed before the Christmas break.

Construction Crew.

2km gravel sheeting program on the Meeberrie-Wooleen road

3km realignment—3km gravel sheeting—widening of floodway's - straightening of approaches to grid and creek crossing from the boundary grid of Beringarra/Nookawarra heading north on the Beringarra-Pindar road

3km gravel sheeting (over stony section) – plus new bunds and drains on the Beringarra-Cue road. New alignment corner (known as Dick's corner) on the Beringarra-Mt-Gould road plus some off shoot drains in low areas.

2.7km gravel sheeting—new bunds—rebuilding of new contour banks (2.4km long) on the Beringarra-Byro from the west end intersection.

At this stage crew are working on a 13km gravel sheeting program starting 5km south of Byro station heading south . 5.5km of road has been formed up in readiness for gravel sheeting with 2km of gravel carted onto road in readiness for spreading out. Please take care when driving in this area of works and obey traffic signs.

At the end of October construction crew will move their camp and equipment down to the Carnarvon-Mullewa road, 70km south of the settlement to start work on the 4km of reforming- gravel sheeting and sealing of bitumen. With the completion of these works (mid-March 2014) this will take bitumen from settlement south to Murchison river totalling 73km.

Crew will complete roads in the Erong area by 1/10/2013 then will move to Byro homestead and do a full grade north to our boundary on the Carnarvon-Mullewa road. This road will then have had a complete grade in readiness for the Landor races traffic. Crew will then complete Beringarra-Byro road and then full maintenance grade back south to Settlement doing all side roads – Woodleigh-Byro road, Mt Narryer homestead road, Muggon road, Butchers Track, Muggon/Butchers-track road.

Heavy Maintenance Crew

Heavy 2 (Paul Squires) and Heavy 1 (Sandy) are working on the Beringarra/Pindar road (north from the MRO turn off) rebuilding old bunds and placing in new bunds on this section to 21km south of Nookawarra . Works will also include the removal of 4 grids on Beringarra-Pindar and one on the Nookawarra -Mileura road on Nookawarra station . (Thank you Isabella for your letter to the Shire advising grids no longer required)

If any station in the Shire of Murchison have grids that are no longer in use please email the Works Supervisor works@murchison.wa.gov.au or send a letter to the shire advising grids can be removed.

5 new 24ft grids will be in this years works program replacing the existing 12ft grids on the Beringarra-Pindar road starting late this year from the south end at Pindar.

Mr Rossco Foulkes-Taylor was successful in the tender for the replacement of these grids.

Works will commence mid October, there will be `road works' and `detour' signs in place. Please slow down and drive to traffic signage. This grid replacement work will be over three weeks but roads over grids will not be open for 4weeks.

2012 - 2013 Murchison Museum President's Report

Thank you all for coming to this important meeting.

In July last year our community was shattered with the loss of an exceptional person. Kaz Collins was taken away following a dreadful accident.

Kaz left us with a lovely, tidy and efficient working museum.

A quartz-filled dome has been erected near to the quartz-filled basket seat on the main Walk A special message will be placed on the top.

A successful Grant which she had carefully prepared and presented to Government, was announced in early August 2012.

This last year has been taken up with two main items...

The need to find a manager for our museum and

Working on the upgrade to the new Botanical Walk.

Members of the Murchison Settlement carried on caring for the museum and showing visitors through the building for months following August 2012.

A huge thank you to all of you for carrying us through until we found someone permanent to take over.

During June 2012, before Amanda arrived, Rex and Pam Lewington looked after the museum. Apart from showing around visitors, they undertook clearing and cleaning both outside and inside (museum and cottage). Rex has made a full video record of the entire premises. This disk will help us make certain that there is a complete record of all donated items. Some people often ask me "where is thethat we gave to the Murchison in ...?"

A big thank you to both of them for giving up their time and helping out.

In later June we welcomed Amanda Rowland who assumed management of our unique, local family and district museum.

Amanda introduced a different aspect for the layout in the building.

There were some things that had to be done in order to re-establish the museum cottage as it had been utilised as an office.

Council very generously have offered to take on costs associated with a new internet service. The previous service was ruled obsolete.

We had to purchase new beds, chairs, extra kitchen gear and some other important items.

Trevor and Leanne have built an excellent netting fence north of the cottage and cleaned up the old garden. The area around the museum was tidied up, new plants introduced and the whole place made very presentable. I urge you all to look in the museum building, note any changes and make comment to the museum committee. Some of the items have been moved, some have been much better labelled and some more strategically placed.

Earlier this year, a beautiful old Boolardy wool wagon came home from the Greenough Pioneer Museum. We can thank Stan Gratte for arranging the move.

A shed cover has been built partly by local carpenter Dai Thomas and completed thanks to Trevor and Leanne. New (old) Boolardy gates have been placed at the front of the shelter. Steve built some grand-looking hinges to hold the gates. A fence around the whole cart is yet to be constructed.

In addition to the Boolardy gear, we inherited from Greenough a large old cart wheel shrinker. Robbie F.T. powder-coated this huge item a smart red-colour and carted it back to Murchison. It stands on a slab near the wagon. This shrinker was used at Pindar Siding, stolen from there years ago and eventually recovered. It ended up at the Pioneer museum.

Pindar was the southern end of the wool wagon pathway from the Gascoyne and Murchison. Before the railway was constructed all the way to Meekatharra, almost all the wool from the East Gascoyne, Meekatharra, Cue and Murchison ended up being put on rail at Pindar Siding.

Let me give you an update on the progress of the Botanical Walk.

I will pass around a précis of our Walk financial position today rather than go into all the many and various work stages in this report.

Suffice to say the next most pressing requirement to complete the Walk is proper signage,

a general tidy up of the surrounding ground area and completion and compaction of the path.

I will need to present a detailed account of all the works and expenditure to the Dept. of Conservation. This is part of our obligation. At the end of July this year, I had to request an extension of time for spending the Grant and completing the Project. We do have a little flexibility now.

Meg Officer has worked tirelessly on putting names to all the plants. She has also helped us put out the named slabs under the correct foliage.

We need to work on a comprehensive brochure which will explain additional points about the named plants. Meg has compiled an interim and brief brochure available at the office.

Please make some time to walk the Walk and make comment.

Kaz did a great job in preparing the Grant Application but I have had to juggle the various sections so that our budget did not blow out. In addition Carol and I have tried to use as many local people as possible for the work needed. Some have gifted back an amount to the Museum but it is not a compulsory budget "give-back". In kind contributions have been exceptionally generous.

My thanks go to Carol for her support and work as Secretary.

Again, thank you to everyone for any and all assistance.

I will move that my report be accepted.

MUSEUM CURATOR'S REPORT

It is coming up for the time when the dust covers go on in the Museum. The weather is warming up and the nomads are heading south again. The Museum has had a steady stream of these high quality visitors over the winter; typically older types who have great practical knowledge about things in the Collection and have the time and patience to share what they know.

I have sent thanks to the man who sent four odd-looking screws and a special screwdriver with pre-

cise instructions on how to fasten the plastic dome that sits over the Sun Clock onto its wooden lectern. Also, Lindsay from Carnarmah sent some old sacks for me to fix the Coolgardie Safe walls and it is now in full working order – including being stocked with one demonstration stubby of Cooper's Pale Ale. Although the capillary action does not seem to be happening as I had hoped, I am convinced the theory is sound and have been encouraging the fridge along with the hose.

Inside the Museum I have contributed a number of handwritten panels that reflect conversations I have had with locals about life in this region, past and the present. As well as acknowledging where they come from, these panels talk about objects in the context of contemporary life in the region. A dingo trap, for example, is now an exhibit that tells visitors of the factors that have led to the decline of the sheep industry and the dingoes' role in this decline. This storytelling reflects my understanding of why history and its telling, matters. Feedback from visitors has encouraged me to believe that people appreciate glimpses of the real life of the region they are travelling through.



This approach suggests that while objects from the past are static, they are brought to life by people's relationship to them. Every voice from every generation will reflect different experiences depending on the context of that relationship. Thus history is fleshed out by many voices and choices are made about who gets to tell the stories which ones are left in and which are left out.

History is always dangerous territory.

On August 17, visitor numbers were boosted by the *Astrofest* when over 100 people went through the Museum. Anne Walton, a video/performance artist and I produced a video called *Museum-in-a-bowl*. After dark people came to experience the Collection in a different way and *Cartwheel*, a projection on the south wall of the Museum added to the pleasure of the night. *

Another highlight of the season was a visit from Nan Broad and former long-time curator Marie Wendland in August. They spent two days in the Museum talking about the objects in the Collection, and these conversations, as well as intermittent encounters with Jano and Carol have added to my stock of knowledge about the region.

I have loved my time here and Anne has found herself drawn back to the place for days more than she anticipated to relieve me as caretaker. To Di, Peta, Sharon and Jenny thanks for helping me and Anne with innumerable office matters. To Trevor and Leanne, THANKS FOR THE VEGIES! and the use of different tools and the odd plastic tie. And thanks to Paul who keeps adding plants to the caretaker's cottage patch. The Station and Museum Ladies are always great fun and a major source of information and inspiration. Thank you for always welcoming me into the kitchen.

There are plans afoot at the Museum as the Committee gears up to develop ideas for the 2014 season. Watch this space.

RE: August 2013 Update - Activities at the Murchison Radio-astronomy Observatory (MRO)

Developments at the MRO

ASKAP telescope granted a clear view

The Science and Industry Endowment Fund (SIEF) has awarded \$6 million to the Australian Square Kilometre Array Pathfinder (ASKAP) Project to ensure optimum scientific impact with the telescope. The grant will be used to fund the construction and installation of an additional six phased array feed (PAF) receivers onto ASKAP antennas at the Murchison Radio-astronomy Observatory in Western Australia. These innovative radio camera receivers have the ability to revolutionise the field of radio astronomy, transforming sky survey speeds by more than a factor of twenty.

ASKAP requires one phased array feed receiver (or PAF, a kind of radio camera) for each of the 36 antennas that make up the complete array to achieve its full scientific potential. Together with an additional \$6 million commitment by CSIRO, the SIEF funding will allow 30 of the 36 antennas to have PAFs installed

This new funding will help ASKAP become the largest, most sensitive survey radio telescope on the planet. Lewis Ball, Chief of Astronomy and Space Science, said. 'As the number of PAFs on ASKAP increase, the scientific capability of ASKAP rises significantly, allowing the telescope to survey large areas of sky with unprecedented sensitivity and speed.'

'ASKAP will be able to deliver transformational, ground-breaking astronomy in the areas of cosmology, galaxy evolution, cosmic magnetic fields and the nature of gravity, continuing CSIRO's role as a world leader in radio astronomy science. This extra funding from SIEF and CSIRO will considerably increase ASKAP's survey speed.'

Currently in its commissioning phase, the ASKAP telescope will exist as a standalone instrument before eventually forming the core of the future Square Kilometre Array Phase One Survey telescope, to be built in Australia later this decade. This will see 60 new antennas added to ASKAP's 36, with PAFs on all antennas.

Our previous MRO Site Manager, Barry Turner resigned from CSIRO and has moved back to New South Wales, having accepted a position with Charles Stuart University. I wish to thank Barry for his hard work and dedication during the construction of the MRO and the ASKAP projects.

Free Public Lecture - Pulsars at the Geraldton Grammar



Dr George Hobbs will deliver a FREE public lecture at the Geraldton Grammar School – Batavia Hall on Thursday 12 September 2013 commencing at 6pm.

Lecture Title: Pulsars, black holes and gravitational waves

High above us in the sky, super massive black holes orbit each other, producing ripples in space and time. Dr George Hobbs, a research scientist at CSIRO, will describe research being carried out in Australia to try and make the first detection of these gravitational waves using observations of an extreme type of star called a 'pulsar'. Pulsars are small spinning stars that spin hundreds of times each second and have massive magnetic fields. Dr Hobbs will explain how these pulsars are discovered, what we use them for, how they can be studied to look for gravitational waves and the current status of our project.

Pulse@Parkes Session at Geraldton

On Friday 13 September 2013, CSIRO will conduct a Pulse@Parkes Session for representatives from the four Geraldton High Schools. Dr George Hobbs and Rob Hollow (CSIRO Astronomy & Space Science) will conduct the session. PULSE@Parkes is an innovative project that provides high school students the opportunity to control the famous Parkes radio telescope. Students observe pulsars under the guidance of professional astronomers and interpret the data collected during their observation session. We are very pleased to be able to offer this special opportunity to the Geraldton science students.

Murchison Astrofest 2013

The Murchison Astrofest was held on Saturday 17 August 2013. Mr Sandy McTaggart (Chair, Murchison Astrofest Committee) welcomed participants to the second Murchison Astrofest. Cr Ross Foulkes-Taylor (Deputy Shire President) and I welcomed participants to the Astrofest.

Our keynote speakers were Dr Lisa Harvey-Smith (CSIRO's ASKAP Project Scientist) and Dr Ken Freeman the Winner of the 2012 Prime Minister's Prize for Science. Wajarri Elder, Uncle Alan Egan was the Astrofest's Bush Professor. He conducted guided walks showing people the unique plants and animals found at the Murchison Settlement.

I think this was a great success, with around 300 people (maximum capacity !) signed up. The stargazing was great (in spite of the moon), and everyone enjoyed the wonderful food, music and large scale campout. It also provided significant income for the Murchison Oasis Roadhouse and businesses in Mullewa, which was good.

I want to thank Priscilla Clayton, the Astrofest Committe and the Murchison Shire Council staff who did such a great job of organising this – and of course, to the Geraldton and Perth Astronomy Groups and ICRAR (International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research), who kindly brought their wonderful telescopes for everyone to look through. The extensive support, both financial, in-kind and volunteer is essential for activities of this kind and I am grateful to all who helped in many different ways.



Nationals deliver on promise to boost regional arts

A further \$900,000 will be delivered over next three years through the Royalties for Regions Performing Arts Regional Tours Boost initiative, which has already contributed \$400,000 to regional arts since 2011.

Vince Catania, Member for North West Central, said The Nationals WA acknowledged the important contribution culture and arts programs and events made to creating vibrant and liveable regional communities.

"We promised to increase investment in arts in regional WA and have now delivered on that through Royalties for Regions," said Vince. "This funding will help build the capacity of indigenous arts centres and organisations, extend regional arts programs, support music programs and help bring touring artists and performers to regional areas.

"It will also help sustain and develop grassroots regional arts programs and allow peak organisations such as Country Arts WA rollout funding frameworks to support cultural and entertainment centres."

Country Arts WA has already welcomed the budget announcement, saying it was a historical moment that would have far-reaching impacts on the State well into the future.

Vince said the funding commitment would serve to enrich cultural activities in North West Central.




