News from the CEO's Desk

Hi All

At the last issue we briefly updated all in relation to works and events that were well underway and we are delighted to say that many have been completed.

Works & Projects Snapshot

Carnarvon-Mullewa Construction and Sealing.



15.2 km two-coat, 7.2m wide seal including floodway stabilisation completed at the southern boundary of the Shire. A 1.0km section around Curbur has also been completed. As outlined elsewhere in this issue, a great effort from all.

Murchison Airport Taxiway Floodlighting

Successful grant application to provide floodlighting at the end of the taxiway to assist with patient transfers.

Indigenous Language & Arts

A recent funding application has been submitted for an exciting new opportunity with Pia Wadjarri Remote School.

Solar Power to the Murchison Settlement

Awaiting advice relating to our Clean Energy
Fund application.

Flood Damage

Our contracted Flood Damage crews (THEM Earthmoving and Squires Resources) have all but completed Flood Damage works and also undertaken additional Council funded repair works. Meanwhile, one new Flood Event has been approved by DRWFA.

Murchison Masterplan

Draft launched on 15 May 2021 with additional public comment being sought. Some Masterplans tend to sit on the shelf but not this one as Council's aim is to start to deliver a suite of long overdue projects in and around the Settlement.

Extent and scope are being determined but these include (in no particular order of priority) a Transportable Classroom, Community Sports Centre Upgrade, Community Swimming Pool and Splash Pad, new Caravan Ablution Block, New Ensuite to Caravan Park, general Settlement Amenity Improvements, plus an interactive playground upgrade. Whilst not all projects will be achievable initially, substantial inroads are expected.

Now in full swing as a Council operation under a community focussed approach. Nick Drew and Pixie Phillips are permanently on site and supplemented by a raft of casual help. Changes and improvements have been steady as we all

adapt to a new operating environment. Feedback thus far has been extremely positive.

For all those that have lived or now reside in Murchison we all understand what is our *Raison* 'd'etre or purpose or reason for living here.

Previous generations of pastoralists who established the Shire knew this implicitly, with the Murchison Settlement being developed to ensure that it is an attractive focal point, one that enables the Shire to function successfully and deliver a range of services that will underpin community, cultural and economic development within the Settlement and broader Shire.

The decline in numbers of those pastoralists and families means that the recruitment of right personnel is perhaps more important than ever. This is our advantage despite being remote as we have a great place to live and work in.

If anyone needs evidence of this, just look at the recent outstanding Biggest Morning High Tea Cancer Fund raising event, which was held at the Murchison Community Centre in May. Put on by and supported by Murchison locals, to a standard that would be the envy of any larger regional centre.

Rossco's Rundown



Apparently, its 4 months since the last Monologue - on the whole a nice damp 4 months and it's great to see the country responding.

I mentioned in my last 'Rossco's Rundown' the promise of a fibre cable for Pia and the Settlement from CSIRO and, as far as I'm aware, the planning for this has commenced. Like the current cable, this one will be owned by AARNET, as opposed to CSIRO so, while CSIRO can influence the outcome, they can't control it. Hopefully they will be sensible and pick up a couple of stations on the way.

There has been a heap of flood damage works done in the first half of the year which is now complete. Thanks to the crews of THEM and Squires that carried out this work. I continue to receive positive feedback about our roads from the public which is very encouraging.

Recently I've been speaking with another Shire's President wanting to pick my brains about the bunding etc that we do, as he had noticed a stark difference in health of the country along the road when travelling between shires and is keen to get this happening in his shire.

On that subject, Council has just finished this year's program of bunding on old Shire roads. I am proud of the rehab work we've done on old roads over the years. It's not very visible to the public but it is important for our environment and, I think, it's the responsible thing to do given the damage old roads can do, when left unchecked, to form man made creeks.

Many of you will have seen the new bitumen north of our southern boundary on the Carnarvon Mullewa Road. Our crew were highly complimented by the bitumen contractor on the excellent preparation of the surface prior to sealing. The Construction Crew's next job will be a realignment of the section of road at the Pine Grove turnoff to straighten things out a bit.

The Settlement water supply being non-potable and inconsistent in quality continues to be a real concern for Council, and with a recent announcement of some extra funding for next year we have made it one of our top priorities to sort out. A rough plan at present includes a new entire Settlement ring main (with no dead ends which allow stagnant water to build up) and some storage tanks that can be totally sealed. Hopefully we can get stuck into doing something and stop just talking about possibilities, which is something Council has been a bit guilty of in the past.

As I write it is a few days until the Murchison Polocrosse Carnival and I wish the organisers, players and spectators all the best for a successful event.

Born in Melbourne, and grew up in Gosnells, nickname is Cozzy...(from Gozzy)
Ha! © I have always loved working and living in the red dirt country.

Started working after school hours at the local supermarket, and

graduated to Spaghetti's restaurant in South Perth, where I worked in the kitchen on broiling duties. Then off to a carwash where I managed the bubbles - before landing my first post school city job at Jackson McDonald Solicitors as an outside clerk and continued working in the legal sector for a further 12 years - the rest is pretty much history. After a time in and out of the Courts, I decided I wanted to take a break and do something that I enjoy - film....so I enrolled at Murdoch and studied Media with a major in screen production. It was from here that I was first introduced to the Murchison back in 2012 when I was contracted by Rangelands NRM to produce two documentaries on wild dog predation on small livestock, located here in the Southern Rangelands and in SW Queensland.

I participated in the running of the Southern Rangelands Sustainable Pastoralism Bash. Bash, a three-day event theme was "Re-igniting enthusiasm for, and the profitability of, the pastoral industry and communities through collaborative efforts to facilitate social networks. reduce the predation of livestock and re-build the environment through control of total grazing pressure". The Bash was a prelude to the canvassing of Ministers for support for the establishment of the Murchison Regional Vermin Cell, and keeping industry informed about wild dog predation. In more recent times I have been involved in research and preparation of legal documents for a native title claim which is currently before the Federal Court.

My experience in Local Government began in January 2016 at the Shire of Yalgoo where I was employed as the Coordinator of Governance and Technical Services. Here at the Murchison, I aim to develop a wide range of projects over the years

and just recently completed a funding application with the Indigenous Language and Arts Competitive program to undertake an arts project with the children, Elders and community members at Pia Wadjarri Remote Community School and Community.

Upon settling in, I was invited to dinner by the Shire's Lord and Master 'Bill' who put on a show in the kitchen and is quite the chef if you didn't know...but his efforts were superseded only weeks later by Colleen when I was invited to Curbur station for an evening of delicious roast dining! At the dinner was the Shire's finance guru Keith and his better half Dianne who shared many fascinating stories including their love and collection of cars...Wow...what I would do to get behind the wheel of just one...C'mon Keith! I don't think either of us will ever forget witnessing that incredible lightning storm on our travels back to the Settlement - It truly was something else!

The local mechanic Stewey was nice enough to take me out to a dirt road (this was hard to find) where I could dust off my old firearms and get them sighted in again...I had my doubts but Stewey - you proved me wrong! The Official Story

Whilst it is still COVID-19, COVID-19, COVID-19, last year's 2020 was a very good positive year to reflect upon and appreciate. The COVID-19 situation has enabled the Council heed the messages from State Government to spend to stimulate the local economy, but in a responsible manner, and we have and are doing just that!

Construction wise Mark Jones and crew comprising Ivor Dumbris, Glen Pinnegar, Brent Cowmeadow and new plant operator Peter Troy have been well established down south working on constructing a large section of the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road, working north from the Shire Boundary.

Several floodway sections were stabilised and 15.2 km of two coat of bitumen seal 7.2m wide was laid by Boral in May, in what was perhaps one of the largest Shire Staff related project that had ever been done.

We are all delighted with the result.

At the May Council Meeting Cr P Squires also praised the work of Councils' staff and contractors who worked on the construction and sealing a section of the Carnarvon-Mullewa north from the City of Greater Geraldton Boundary Road as evidence of one of the best projects of its type undertaken by shire staff. It was agreed that this be noted in the minutes.

Funding assistance was obtained from Main Roads WA, Roads to Recovery and the Commonwealth's Local Roads Community Infrastructure Fund.

The project requires considerable adaptation from that originally envisaged. It was originally thought that a single coat seal be undertaken, but this changed to a two-coat seal as it would be more cost effective in the long run and would deliver a better result.



In the process it was realised that the curve at the Pinegrove turnoff needed realignment so this work, and the associated boundary grid, will need to be undertaken in the future.

Meanwhile, delays due to rain, cyclone Seroja and the late arrival of Boral meant that the crew needed to water and roll the pavement (prepared for sealing) for several weeks. All up a very trying period.

Since this time Council has received advice of additional Local Roads Community

Infrastructure Funding so the construction and sealing of the remaining 21km of gravel road within over the next 3 years is a real possibility.

Mark didn't reveal the source of his advice, the most inexperienced part of the crew, who could see that if they moseyed on down to Curbur, constructed a section, promise Colleen (Will's Wife) a seal, keep her happy and be closer to home. Might get some South African cakes and biscuits as well!

By this stage Jonesy's Cavaliers were pretty pumped and they floated the idea of working down south (being closer to Gero),

and perhaps start construction ahead of sealing, rather than just a resheet. Will took it to CEO Bill and, fresh from a rethink and with additional funds in the bag snapped, "yep!"

1 MAN & A BIKE SERIES 2 - MURCHISON

After the successful launch of series one of the 1 MAN & A BIKE televised on Channel 7 in late 2020 Visage Productions have announced they will be producing series two for broadcast later this year. In the first series they

travelled WA's Goldfields, the Midwest, the Central West and the Wheatbelt.


The new episode will provide an opportunity to realise a specific branding and marketing opportunity for the Murchison Oasis Settlement and the greater Murchison. By raising public awareness, the project provides an opportunity to attract tourism to the Shire while boosting the socio-economic and cultural enrichment and regeneration for the Settlement and the broader region.

FUN FACTS

- The five-episode series will be broadcast throughout Western Australia on the Seven Network, the State's highest rating free-to-air channel, on a weekend afternoon later in 2021.
- · After broadcast, the episodes will be added to the Seven Network on-line catch-up service.
- Filming for the series to commence once the episodes are fully subscribed (plan is to commence midyear with filming in destinations appropriate to seasonal weather conditions and attractions, for example we filmed during the wildflower season last series).
- The overall aim of the series model is to promote Western Australia's road trip possibilities, from a different perspective.
- The series is to be produced by VISAGE Productions www.visageproductions.com.au a Perth based production company which has been in operation for over 27 years.
- Each episode will be allocated to a particular region or road-trip, with multiple-LGA collaborations coming together to form an episode.
- · Series to be filmed in high definition with multiple use of drone technology (within CASA approved areas).
- · Each episode, based on previous series' will be filmed over four-five days.



Murchison community update lune 2020



The Murchison GeoRegion is Australia's first major geotourism development

The Murchison GeoRegion harnesses the subregion's incredible geology, natural landscapes, biodiversity (flora and fauna) as well as culture (Aboriginal and non Aboriginal) to offer unique experiences to a growing national and international geotourism market worth millions of dollars.

The GeoRegion connects 21 key geological sites across the seven Murchison local government areas to draw people into each community, providing new markets and opportunties for local people (particularly Aboriginal people), businesses, schools and community groups.

The concept was first identified at a FACET (tourism) conference in Mount Magnet (2009) and was formalised in 2014 / 15 via the Mid West Regional Blueprint and Mid West Tourism Development Strategy. Through engagement and consultation throughout the Murchison, geotourism was confirmed by local people as a significant future economic development opportunity.

The seven Murchison local governments drove this project collaboratively, with support from external agencies and stakeholders. All seven Councils have endorsed the Murchison GeoRegion, that is the Shires of Cue, Meekatharra, Mount Magnet, Murchison, Sandstone, Wiluna and Yalgoo. Organisations and residents across the Murchison region have shared their expertise and materials.

Through 2019 and 2020, stage 1 of the Murchison GeoRegion project was developed. This comprises consistent branding and designs, site research, brochures, an app and a website. These will be released once inter-regional borders are relaxed, following the lift of COVID-19 restrictions.

With regional and intrastate tourism expected to see significant growth in the near future, this presents a wonderful opportunity for Murchison businesses to leverage off something new and unique, which is now ready for launch. Once interstate and international borders are relaxed, Murchison businesses could be well positioned to continue that growth.

An opportunity and challenge now exists for businesses to develop new ideas, attractions and tourist packages (tours etc) based on geotourism. Having a plan for recovery, built on new product offerings and markets, makes a lot of sense for all regional businesses.

Future stages of the project are expected to include the following.

- Signage and visitor infrastructure at each site
- Marketing and promotional activity / materials (advertising, merchandise etc)
- Digital media including virtual / augmented reality, enhanced digital storytelling
- Tourism product development and business development support
- Progress towards hosting Australia's first UNESCO Global Geopark in the Murchison There are 147 UNESCO Global Geoparks in 41 countries, but none in Australia so a Murchison

TRADITIONAL ANZAC BISCUITS

INGREDIENTS [Serves 24]

1 cup rolled oats

1 cup plain flour

3/4 cup white sugar

3/4 desiccated coconut

125 g butter

1 tablespoon golden syrup

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 tablespoons boiling water



PREPARATIION/METHOD


Prep: 10 minutes. Cook: 15 minutes. Extra time 5 minutes

- 1 Preheat oven to 180°C
- 2 Grease biscuit tray
- 3 Mix oats, flour, sugar and coconut together
- 4 In a small saucepan over low heat, melt the syrup and butter together
- 5 Mix the soda and the boiling water and add to the melted butter and syrup
- 6 Add the butter mixture to the dry ingredients and combine
- 7 Dollop the mixture by teaspoon onto greased tray
- 8 Bake for 12-15 minutes


